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## Fetal Heart Monitoring - AWHONN

Method of fetal heart rate assessment, either auscultation or  
electronic fetal monitoring, is dependent on risk factors and  
clinician preference. If high risk, determine, assess and document  
fetal heart rate every 15 minutes in first stage of labor and at least  
every 5 minutes in second stage.
